Hiring in April Rebounds to 211,000 Jobs

Latino Unemployment Increases to 5.2%



Leisure and Hospitality Leads Job Growth

Restaurants and hotels added 55,000 jobs in April. While Latinos are overrepresented in this high-growth industry, occupations within leisure and hospitality tend to pay below-median wages. Annual increases in wages have also been sluggish, highlighting the need to raise the federal minimum wage to improve the lives of Latinos and all Americans.

The Employment Situation for Latino Workers in April 2017

The U.S. Department of Labor <u>reported</u> today that employers added 211,000 jobs in April, a rebound from March's low number of 98,000. The national unemployment rate also declined to 4.4%, fueled by a 75-month streak of job growth following the end of the Great Recession in 2009, when the unemployment rate was 10%. However, the Latino unemployment rate inched up by 0.1% to 5.2%. While Latinos still have the highest labor force participation rate of any racial and ethnic group (66.2% in April), 227,000 Latinos dropped out of the labor force last month.
